### How to Judge a Member's Voting Record

AFSCME selects a few roll-call votes from the hundreds cast by members of Congress every session. In choosing these votes, AFSCME attempts to fairly represent a lawmaker's position on issues determined to be important to AFSCME members — first and foremost as workers, but also as citizens and union brothers and sisters.

This voting scorecard is one of the key factors used in making judgments on AFSCME campaign support, endorsements or contributions from PEOPLE — AFSCME's Political Action Committee, or PAC. Other important factors often include the member's official leadership position, chairmanship or seniority on important committees, leadership in a state's congressional delegation, and accessibility and responsiveness to AFSCME's lobbying efforts.

## 1. Promoting Equal Pay for Equal Work

**AFSCME Position: Yes**

The House approved the Paycheck Fairness Act (H.R. 12), which makes it easier for women to seek legal remedies when they have been victims of wage discrimination. The bill makes it clear that men and women should be paid equally for equal work and removes caps on the compensation a victim can receive from a discrimination lawsuit.

### House Vote Number 8

AFSCME supported the bill, which the House passed by a vote of 256 to 163 on January 9, 2009.

## 2. Increasing Child Health Care Coverage

**AFSCME Position: Yes**

The House approved the Children's Health Insurance Program Reauthorization Act of 2009 (H.R. 2), which expands coverage for low-income children who lack health insurance.

### House Vote Number 16

AFSCME supported the bill, which the House approved by a vote of 289 to 139 on January 14, 2009.

## 3. Fighting Wage Discrimination

**AFSCME Position: Yes**

The House approved the Lilly Ledbetter Fair Pay Act of 2009 (S. 181), which restores long-standing pay discrimination protection the Supreme Court eliminated in its 2007 *Ledbetter v. Goodyear Tire & Rubber Co.* decision.

### House Vote Number 37

AFSCME supported the bill, which the House approved by a vote of 250 to 177 on January 27, 2009.

## 4. Providing State and Local Government Aid

**AFSCME Position: Yes**

The House approved the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 (H.R. 1), which provides vital state and local fiscal relief, unemployment assistance and key funding for job preservation and creation.

### House Vote Number 70

AFSCME supported the bill, which the House approved by a vote of 246 to 183 on February 13, 2009.

## 5. Increasing Public Safety Funding

**AFSCME Position: Yes**

The House approved the COPS Improvements Act of 2009 (H.R. 1139), which provides \$1.8 billion annually for the Cops on the Beat program. The program provides grants to state and local governments to hire additional law enforcement officers and prosecutors and obtain or upgrade technology and equipment.

### House Vote Number 206

AFSCME supported the bill, which the House approved by a vote of 342 to 78 on April 23, 2009.



## 6. Providing Paid Parental Leave

**AFSCME Position: Yes**

The House passed the Federal Employees Paid Parental Leave Act (H.R. 626), which provides four weeks of paid leave to federal employees for the birth or adoption of a child.

### House Vote Number 310

AFSCME supported the bill, which the House passed by a vote of 258 to 154 on June 4, 2009.

## 7. Extending Unemployment Benefits

**AFSCME Position: Yes**

The House passed the Unemployment Compensation Extension Act of 2009 (H.R. 3548), which provides an additional 13 weeks of unemployment benefits in high unemployment states.

### House Vote Number 722

AFSCME supported the bill, which the House passed by a vote of 331 to 83 on September 22, 2009.

## 8. Reforming Health Care

**AFSCME Position: Yes**

The House passed the Affordable Health Care for America Act (H.R. 3962). The bill addressed many of AFSCME's priorities. Rather than taxing high-cost plans, the bill funded reform through tax increases on wealthy households. It included measures to help reduce cost pressures on our coverage. The bill also required most large employers to either provide coverage or help fund health care for workers, improved Medicare and addressed abuses by insurance companies, such as denying coverage to those with pre-existing conditions.

### House Vote Number 887

AFSCME supported the bill, which the House passed by a vote of 220 to 215 on November 7, 2009.

## 9. Protecting and Creating Jobs

**AFSCME Position: Yes**

The House passed the Jobs for Main Street Act of 2010 (H.R. 2847), which redirects unspent money from last year's Wall Street bailout to create jobs and stabilize employment. It focuses on stabilizing jobs through infrastructure investment, preserving and creating public service jobs and continuing emergency funding for families hurt by the economy. AFSCME fought hard to ensure that the bill includes key funding for state and local governments.

### House Vote Number 991

AFSCME supported the bill, which the House passed by a vote of 217 to 212 on December 16, 2009.
